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A MESSAGE FROM MURAL ARTIST AND ILLUSTRATOR CLARA NICOLL

Hi, my name is Clara Nicoll and I am a mural artist and illustrator.

All the staff and students were lovely to me during my week at The Priory School, thank you for all the lovely compliments! A few asked questions (thank you again), but for those who have questions but didn't ask, here is a bit of information about my work.

I was commissioned to paint a mural in the dining room and felt that something that encouraged thought and debate would be of interest to the school. We talked about democracy and what democracy could mean to the individual, and came up with the key words **Equality**, **Justice** and **Diversity**. My brief was to come up with an image that compassed those words.

The school and I decided on the following images in the mural: a diverse range of students; the Houses of Parliament; a parliament of rooks; the scales of justice; and the LGBTQ flag. This was painted in the style of Russian propaganda posters from World War 2 to create a striking painting that could be seen from the far end of the dining room. The colour scheme of this kind of art also fits in well with red, black and silver.

I put together a draft drawing, which was amended until we got the image just right. I then asked people I knew to pose so that I could make up a portfolio. I made a jpeg of my work and projected it on to the wall so I could get the composition just right and then handpainted it on. Once the mural is finished I will apply a hard-wearing varnish to protect the image.

ENVIRONMENTAL AWARENESS AT TPS

The Priory School Eco Committee have now created an action plan as part of the application for the Eco Schools Bronze Award:

1. Turning Lights Off

Students will be designing a sticker/sign to be placed by the doors of classrooms to remind people leaving to turn off the lights.

Students will be designated as 'light monitors' to turn off lights in classrooms that are not being used.

2. Litter picks

Once every two weeks Mr Rainforth will take a group of students out to conduct litter picks around the school site.

Initially this will be for the Eco Group, but over time this will be opened up to the wider school community to get involved with.

3. Single Use Plastics

Removal of polystyrene and plastic cups from staff meetings and encouraging staff and students to bring their own reusable water bottles to school.

As part of this initiative, we have partnered up with a local charity called Surfers Against Sewage (SAS) to help reduce our plastic consumption in school.

DID YOU KNOW?

Does Your Child Have a Job?

If your child has a job it is important you are aware of the laws surrounding this and the number of hours they are legally allowed to work. We must all also be aware of the impact of employment on school work.

Here are some of the laws relating to this:

This guide will give parents more information about the work their child is able to do whilst in compulsory education. It also provides information as to the responsibilities of the employer.

No child under the age of 13 years of age may be employed. No child of school age can be employed before 7am or after 7pm at any time (even during the school holidays).

On schoolday:	any child may onl 1 hour may be be	y work 2 hours a day. fore school and 1 after school, or 2 hours after school may be worked.	
Sundays	a child of school age may only work 2 hours on any Sunday and then only between 7am-7pm		
Aged 13-14 Years	Saturdays School Holidays	5 hours a day (maximum 12 hours in any week) 5 hours a day (maximum 25 hours in any week)	
Aged 15-16 Years	come 16 years of Saturdays	ubject to these regulations until the end of June, even if they be d in that school year 8 hours a day (maximum 12 hours in any week) 8 hours a day (maximum 35 hours in any week)	

Parents may be fined up to £1,000 if they are found not to be complying with these regulations.

ONLINE SAFETY

Our Computing department recently conducted a survey of 500 students around online activity and the results are as follows:

- 65% spend over 3 hours on their device a day
- Only 18% said that they think their parents know everything they're doing online
- 55% of parents don't have any rules about using the internet at home
- 52% said they rarely or never speak to their parents about the Internet
- 40% have a public social media account that anyone can see and follow
- 38% have live streamed themselves on the internet

- 67% keep their smartphone by their bed at night – and 70% of these admit to regularly looking at their phone after they should have gone to sleep

- Only 20% are using the Apple & Google apps to control screen time & digital wellbeing
- 25% (125 students) agree or strongly agree their smartphone has a negative impact on their health and wellbeing
- 40% of students have sent a message to someone and regretted sending it
- 30% have followed inappropriate accounts for their age on social media

As the use of the internet, social media, email and mobile technologies are becoming increasingly important in the lives of our children, we would like to invite you and your child to an Online Safety evening on Tuesday 4th February at 6.30pm. There have been many stories in the news recently about school children contacting strangers online, cyberbullying, and addiction to devices, and we would like to support you in protecting your child.

There will be practical techniques that you can use to support your child in staying safe as well as an insight into hot topics such as live streaming and ever evolving social media platforms. LOCAL AUTHOR MATT ADCOCK VISITS TPS



On Wednesday 8th January, local author Matt Adcock was invited into The Priory School to meet 'Students of Darkness'. In preparation for World Book Day 2020 (March the 5th), a group of budding authors and illustrators are working on an ambitious, student-led project that will see them publish an anthology of short stories on the theme of 'Darkness and Dystopia' which is also the working title.

The aspiring writers, from Year 7 to 13, have been hard at work creating dark tales and encouraging each other, collaborating through the Google Classroom platform. They are working on all stages of the process, including designing the cover page, editing and marketing of the book. All proceeds from the anthology will go towards buying more books for the school library, fuelling the desire for more diverse and interesting fiction.

The project is being overseen by Mr Mayers, a Lead Practitioner of Media and Computing, who is also a children's author. He helped publish Matt Adcock's debut novel: Complete Darkness, which was released in October 2019 and has topped several Amazon bestsellers charts since. Mr Mayers said, "I invited Matt in to speak to the students because they demonstrated a real interest in stories based around the theme of crime, horror, and darkness. It's pleasing to see so much talent in the school, I thought 'what better way to enhance students' love of reading than to encourage them to publish their own work to a global audience'. I just didn't expect them to lean so heavily into the dark side, so it was only natural that Matt, whose book is set in a dystopian London hellscape, would be a good person to take notes from and inspire their writing..."

The author Q&A session allowed the young people to ask questions about writing fiction, discuss their own ideas, learn about the creative process and get some writing tips and insight from Matt, who talked about the inspiration behind his book. Matt said, "Having read through the various work-in-progress stories I was really impressed with the creativity, energy and writing skill that the young people have shown. This book project is going to be an awesome achievement and a great way to showcase new young writing talent. I had a lot of fun talking to the students who have some really nicely scary ideas – they chose the theme of Darkness & Dystopia and are really delivering with dark near-future tales. The short stories include tales of mind control, robotic enforcement, assorted killers and even guilt and punishment – my personal pick is the baddie who turns children into jumpers!? It's wonderfully grim stuff and I'll certainly be getting a copy on World Book Day. I think we can all look forward to seeing where this writing journey takes them."

YOUTH SPEAKS: ROUND 1

On Monday 13th January we had the first round of Youth Speaks, a debating competition organised by the Rotary club. 
