DID YOU KNOW?

Screen Time and Social Media

How well do you know the apps your child uses? Are you aware of the password protected areas within apps like Snapchat? Did you know Facebook, Snapchat and Instagram have a minimum age limit of 13 and that WhatsApp's is 16? However innocent you feel your own child's use of their phone is, it is near impossible to stop it being infiltrated by other people, some of whom will not have the same standards of behaviour as you or your child.

With increasing use of phones among young people, we have seen a dramatic rise in the number of social media related issues cropping up in and out of school. This includes online bullying, sexting and verbal abuse. Schools and parents have a duty to monitor this and ensure appropriate usage. There is a worrying link to an increase in cases of anxiety and depression as young people seek to 'keep up appearances' and be seen to be part of the numerous social circles that are thrust upon them through these apps.

Young people are often far more adept with their devices than their parents are, allowing them to easily hide away content they don't want their parents to see. Do you know what time they are putting their phones down and going to sleep? Please support us in ensuring appropriate use and remember that we do not permit students to carry phones in school at TPS. Those caught with phones are given a one-hour detention and a parent or other adult is asked to come and collect the phone. Those caught with material of a more serious nature on their phones will have their devices handed to the police.

YEAR 10 HISTORY TRIP TO WASHINGTON DC

On 8th July 2019, 19 excited Year 10 students became the first members of The Priory School to brave the perilous journey over the Atlantic Ocean. The destination? The Harrington Hotel, Washington DC, America! Arriving early in the morning, while their classmates were heading to their usual subjects of the day, these ambassadors (accompanied by Mr Wright and Ms King) prepared to say their final goodbyes to parents and peers, home and county, before stepping onto the coach that would begin their journey halfway across the world.



After the students disembarked at London Heathrow Airport, the race was on to board the IcelandAir Boeing 767 so they could travel on the eight-hour long flight, including a short two-hour detour to Keflavik Airport in Iceland across the pond. Eight hours later they arrived at Dulles Airport in Washington, prepared for a further five days of entertainment in the foreign city they would soon learn all about...

But first we needed to fill our stomachs with the oh so famous American cuisine. Luckily for us, the Hard Rock Cafe was only a five-minute walk from the hotel, so once we had offloaded our luggage brought with us from our far away homes, we set about the streets of Washington to find our first meal. Once full, we returned to our rooms in



the dusk of the American sun and settled down, hopefully not affected by jet lag, for our first night's sleep in the capital.

Tuesday morning soon arrived and we prepared for our first full day in this new country with a full buffet breakfast including anything you can think of - don't worry, it was only Dominic who ate a worryingly large amount of bacon.

Now full up with food, we set off to the National Mall, where we were shown around every single monument and memorial to be seen in the park: The Lincoln, Jefferson and WW2 memorials to name a few. After having our lunch, we then attempted a visit to the National Archives. However, due to the weather problems the day before, we were turned away from entering, so we took the journey back to the hotel and got ready for another meal out, this time at a delicious sports bar which took us past the White House. Full again with food, we wandered back to the hotel to sleep for another night in America.

The next days followed the same routine, with equally enthralling activities to get up to - we visited the Ford Theatre, where President Abraham Lincoln was shot by John Wilkes Booth, then explored the incredible African American Museum of History and Culture, shortly followed by the National Museum of American History and the Archives this time seeing the historic founding documents of America. Thursday contained an uplifting (no pun intended) visit of the National Air and Space Museum, and then a tour around none other than the US Capitol from a guide who couldn't stop cracking cringe worthy jokes. We then journeyed around the Museum of the Native American and finished the day at another restaurant to celebrate the trip and also Emma's birthday.

NEWS FROM OUTDOOR EDUCATION

Following the news back in April that The Priory School had the third highest completion rate in the UK for the Duke of Edinburgh's Award, there has been a series of really exciting expeditions.

In May we took 12 Year 8 students to the Peak District for an introduction to Outdoor Education. Over three days, the students trekked, climbed and kayaked in the south of the national park, getting a great taste for all things outdoors. This was followed by our qualifying expeditions at all three levels of the Duke of Edinburgh's Award.

Forty Year 9 students completed their Bronze award, tackling the Dunstable Downs and having a chance to showcase the skills they had spent a year learning. All teams completed the expedition and over half moved up to start their Silver Award.

In July we took our Gold and Silver participants to Cumbria, where again we saw a 100% success rate in qualifying expeditions. The Silver participants explored from the coastal town of Maryport, inland to Keswick, whilst the Golds tackled some of the most challenging terrain in the Lake District, including summiting both Skiddaw and Scafell Pike, England's highest peak. We are overjoyed to say that most of the Gold participants have now confirmed their presentation ceremonies at the palace to receive their award.

This was swiftly followed by another Introduction to Outdoor Education, this time for a group of Year 10s who would soon be enrolling. These five students spent the day at Henlow Boyd Field, where they learnt the basics of fire lighting, backwoods cooking, kayaking and stand up paddle boarding. They also joined us for the Silver DofE practice weekend expedition in the Southern Peak District.

We were also lucky enough to send two groups off on World Challenge Expeditions. A group of Year 9 students flew to Morocco, where they spent two weeks doing project work in the stunning walled city of Taroudant, trekking in the High Atlas and exploring the coastal city of Essouaria. Their experience was made all the more special by a successful summit of Jebel Toubkal, North Africa's highest mountain. Standing at 4167m this is quite some achievement and hopefully the start of some fantastic mountaineering careers!

Our other World Challenge team, a group of Year 12 and 13 students, flew halfway around the world to the remote but beautiful country of Mongolia. Here they spent a month exploring one of the world's last true wildernesses. They again completed a mix of project work, horseback and foot trekking and exploration, truly getting a chance to get to grips with a unique and ancient culture. This included the chance to stay in traditional Gers with nomads. The whole experience was rounded off by a trip on the Trans-Siberian Railway and three days in Beijing, which included a visit to the great wall.

Since September we haven't been resting either. This academic year we have completed our largest ever sign up for DofE, with 60 students at Bronze and 28 at Silver. We have also launched World Challenge Nepal 2021 for students in Years 11 and 12 and Morocco 2021 for current Year 8.



During their first PSHE lesson of the year, TPS students were tasked with learning about the 5 Ways to Wellbeing.



Following their learning, students competed in creating a school poster to represent this Public Health initiative.

MATCH REPORT: PENALTIES REQUIRED TO SEPARATE PRIORY AND ROUNDWOOD

The first of October meant County Cup time for TPS' Year 8s, who had reached the final of the competition. This game also meant the step up to 11-a-side football for Mr Omar's side, who lined up for kick off in a 3-5-2 formation. Roundwood had a red stripe, so they had to wear blue bibs to avoid clashing with TPS' kit. There were a few chances early on, the first chance was a shot over the crossbar from a corner and then the game started as it meant to go on, counter-attacking football. The first real attack came from TPS with Harrison Donnelly set up by Szymon Pochodaj, but his shot couldn't find the target.

Roundwood Park, from Harpenden, really matched the Priory in all areas of the park, good on the break but a good, pacy defence stopped TPS getting through on many occasions. Roundwood had a few corners but TPS defended them well, with goalkeeper Frank having to claim the ball on a few occasions. Fifteen minutes in it was still 0-0, with a midfield battle starting to develop. On a wet and windy afternoon it was always going to be a bit of a scrappy game, but both teams looked strong on the break and this made for an entertaining game. Seven minutes later, striker Chris Gadsden went up the other end to force a TPS corner after Roundwood scuffed a shot wide. The shot from the corner was going in but it was deflected, a great chance for the Priory. At the other end Priory were defending excellently, with Finn Scourfield playing out from the back really well into the midfield. Twenty four minutes in, the pitch became wetter and the chances dried up for both sides.

At half time the teams were locked in a goalless deadlock, but it was TPS who were the quicker team out of the blocks in the second half, with Joseph's long shot forcing a save from Roundwood's keeper. However, it was Roundwood who eventually took the lead in the 42nd minute (each half lasted 35 minutes). The ball was worked out onto the right flank, and the low cross was slotted in to make it 1-0. The goal triggered a change in formation for TPS, switching to a 4-2-3-1 in the hope of an equaliser. The Priory were certainly knocking on Roundwood's door, with Chris Gadsden providing the attacking pressure on the defenders. Despite Chris' energy, Roundwood certainly defended well and continued to try and play out from the back. With the cold worsening and rain coming down, I was convinced that an equaliser would bring 15 minutes of extra time, so when TPS finally found an equaliser I wasn't the happiest person there! It was James who finally found the net with a great finish into the bottom corner with only seconds to go.

Moments later it was full time, and it was decided that penalties would have to separate the sides, with extra time appealing to nobody. Roundwood scored their first two with two good penalties, but goalscorer James had his shot saved before defender Jaden hit the back of the net. Roundwood scored again to make it 3-1, and then Harrison Donnelly stepped up and fired wide. However, it was clear for all to see that the ball was moving due to the blustery conditions, so Harrison was forced to retake it. The pressure is always on more the second time of asking, and the goalkeeper saved the retake. Roundwood's final penalty was in the bottom corner, 4 out of 4 meant they would progress into the next round of the County Cup. However, the game was closely fought between two excellent sides and it was probably a shame that penalties had to declare a winner and a loser.
